School Opal Cards

SSTS Applications are now Online

From 2 November 2015, a new online School Student Transport Scheme application process is being introduced for schools within the Opal Network, coinciding with the introduction of the School Opal Card in 2016.



If students currently have a school travel pass in 2015, they will automatically receive a School Opal Card at the beginning of the school year in 2016 unless they have changed their personal details (eg address). School Opal Cards which are being automatically renewed will be sent to the school at the beginning of the school year. Students enrolled at CBHS who did not have a travel pass in 2015 but are now eligible (due to a change of address or residency) and new students enrolling must apply online at www.transportnsw.infor/school-students or call 131500. The online application portal will automatically assess eligibility based on distance rules. Online applications must be printed and brought to the school office for endorsement and posting to Transport for NSW. All new applications for 2016 travel will be sent directly to the student's nominated address.

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Bus Changes for 2016

School Special Buses Renumbered

From the start of Term 1 2016, some school special bus services will be renumbered to eliminate any duplication of route numbers. The routes affected at Canterbury Boys High School, Canterbury Girls High School and Canterbury Public School are:

- 613 from and to Campsie will now be 609
- 615 to Belmore will now be 630
- 675 to Belmore will be 631
- 676 from Dulwich Hill shops will be 633
- 676 to Dulwich Hill shops will be 634
- 688 from and to Campsie will be 632

The routes will remain the same. It is only the bus numbers that are changing.

Science Workshop

Canterbury South Public School at CBHS

CSPS had hands-on science experiences in our Science Labs in November. Some Year 9 students volunteered to provide the Stage 3 students with a valuable



and unforgettable experience. The purpose of the workshop was to supplement the work the students were doing in their Stage 3 Science Unit on Solids, Liquids and Gases.



In the Science Labs the Stage 3 students got really involved in demonstrations involving changes of states of matter through the distillation process and iodine sublimation. Students were able to see and understand the different states of matter such as solids, liquids and gases.



Students gained hands on experience with a non-Newtonian Fluid as they were able to punch it. They learnt that, although things can be classified into solids, liquids or gases, there are some substances, like slime, that behave a little strangely. Students were given an opportunity to make their own slime. The students really enjoyed these activities.

Aspire Uni for a Day

On Thursday December 3, Year 9 went on an excursion to the *University of New South Wales* (UNSW). The first place we visited was the *Museum of Human Diseases* where we heard a lecture about the effects of smoking on the lungs and the aorta resulting in Atherosclerosis. We were then given ipads for a quiz to answer questions based on body parts which were on display in glass cases on the wall in the Museum.



The next session was a visit to the UNSW Business School where we worked in groups to create a product or service to sell for Christmas. We had to work out a need for the product, the target audience, the budget, how it would be sold and for what price, a tagline, and how it would be delivered. One interesting job we learnt about was a Social Media Strategist who could earn up to \$200,000 per year!



The final session included a fact relay which involved groups competing against each other to answer questions designed to test our intelligence. We also participated in a brainstorming activity which involved reasons why someone should or should not choose to go university.



From this experience, the three of us would definitely like to attend university in the future. Overall it was a great experience and we very lucky to have the opportunity to visit one of the best universities in Sydney!

B.Inspiring Conference

Between November 30 and December 2, we attended the B.Inspiring Science and Engineering Conference at the *University of Sydney* over three days. We worked collaboratively with students from other schools on a series of different projects.

Day one started off with problem solving and learning about how to think like a scientist. Towards the end of the day we were introduced to the major projects that each group had to complete, which would then be presented during the final day.

The next day, we were given time to collaborate, share ideas and structure our presentations with the rest of our group members. One of the main highlights of the day was a presentation given by Jean Mary Voon, the Head of the B. Inspiring Program. It helped us gain a better understanding of our personal brand.

On the last day we finalised our presentations and filmed our reflection videos which were shown to the audience. The judges were associates of Ms Voon, who were working in major scientific and technological occupations. After presenting our projects, the winners were decided, with Kelepi's group coming first! At the end of the day we received our certificates of participation.

The conference has increased our desire to enter university and gave us the opportunity to expand our comfort zones by meeting new people and working with them.

UNSW Aspire Design Thinking Day

On November 27, a group of Year 10 students were chosen to participate in a Design Project run by Aspire. The aim of this event was to raise awareness and understanding of the design thinking process and social entrepreneurship. We worked in UNSW's newest building, The Michael Crouch Innovation Centre, which is a fabulous learning space for encouraging creativity and working in small groups.



Our students were separated into six different groups, consisting of a mix of students from various schools, and were assigned the task of creating a project design that supports six topics of interest. Some of these topics included; *Mental Health* (finding the balance between social and study life), *Physical Health* (body image), *Food Security* (providing healthy food for children), *Community* (Racism), *Environment* (Ocean plastics) and *Integrating Generations* (care of aging population).

An example of a project that was presented by the group assigned the mental health task was designing a phone/tablet application that balanced social and study life. Another example included the project presented by the group that worked on community racism was also an application that would educate anyone about various races, religions, cultures and traditions in a community. All projects solved problems in a creative way and then were presented to an audience including academic staff, teachers and students.

During the day we had a very special guest come to visit us, the Premier himself, Mike Baird. Mr Baird spent time talking to the students about their work and also gave a motivational speech to inspire the students.
