Where are they now?

Class of 2016

Our 2016 HSC cohort have chosen to pursue a variety of career pathway options. 65% of students successfully transitioned into tertiary studies. The remaining students commenced apprenticeships, traineeships, & employment. Courses undertaken by students at university include: Policing; Sports & Exercise Science; Civil, Biomedical, Mechanical or Software Engineering, Cyber Security; Information Technology; Science; Computer, Medical or Social Science: Business: Commerce: Construction Management; and Media & Advertising. Courses undertaken at TAFE include: Hospitality; Media Technology; and Screen & Media. Students at private colleges have chosen courses in Information Technology and Fine Arts. Students who are undertaking apprenticeships and traineeships chose Carpentry; Electrical and Hospitality. Congratulations to all students and we wish you every success in your future!

HSC Stronger Standards

There has been an introduction of minimum standards in Literacy and Numeracy for students who will complete the Higher School Certificate in 2020; the first cohort that this will affect is the current Year 9 students. Whilst Year 9 students have the chance to pre-qualify for this standard when they sit NAPLAN in May of this year, we urge all parents and students not to be concerned about this introduction of minimum standards, as students will be provided opportunities with several demonstrate that they meet these standards throughout their schooling.

YEAR 9 NAPLAN: A CHANCE TO PREQUALIFY FOR THE STANDARD

Your child can prequalify for the standard by achieving Band 8 or above in their Year 9 NAPLAN reading, writing and numeracy tests this year. This means that they won't have to take the online tests.

It is important for you to know that not all students are expected to achieve Band 8 in their Year 9 NAPLAN tests this year.



Your child will not be stopped from getting the HSC on the basis of their Year 9 NAPLAN results.

Your child's literacy and numeracy skills will continue to develop and it is expected that they will meet the standard either by the end of Year 10, Year 11 or Year 12.

STEM Academy

Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics Program

For nearly six months, our school has been working as part of the Sydney University STEM Academy. Our teachers have undertaken comprehensive professional learning and planned a project for Year 7 to start the school year. Year 7 teachers and students have been working hard during Term 1 to develop the STEM knowledge and skills needed for work and life in the 21st Century.





Year 7 started their STEM focus with a series of three mini-maker activities. In Maths, they explored shapes, surface areas and flotation: designing a Lego structure that would float on water. In Science, they explored physical forces through constructing a wind turbine to lift a weight. In TAS, they built a structure designed to protect an egg when dropped from three storeys above the ground. Students experienced great engagement and success through completing these challenges, with many also building group work and problem solving skills, and their creative thinking.





The final project day took place on Tuesday 28 March. The day started with a presentation from Tom Gordon, a scientist from Sydney University, who also represents the *CSIRO Scientist in Schools* program. Tom's engaging experiments built on a lot of learning covered in science on buoyancy ready for the project day.



Students then started construction, trying to use their STEM knowledge to solve a problem of growing crops in monsoonal climates. In groups, they applied their learning across all subjects in the previous weeks to construct a raft on which to grow crops. They worked hard on their designs and used a variety of everyday materials to construct scale models of their raft design.





After a BBQ lunch, students finally got to test their model rafts. All of the groups succeeded in making a raft that floated and carried soil for growing crops. Groups were awarded prizes for carrying the most weight (the winner's model held 65 scoops of soil), most innovative design and best group work.





Return of the Scientists

Physics in Action

On March 17, CBHS once again, had the opportunity to participate in the Scientist in Schools program. A scientist from the University of Sydney volunteered to perform experiments in the science laboratories with the latest equipment. Scientists in Schools in a National Program run by volunteers. Its goal is to bring real science, by real scientists, into the classroom. CBHS has an ongoing partnership with Tom Gordon. Science Communicator for the School of Physics. USyd. We are privileged to work with Tom and together we share enthusiasm, expertise, and knowledge to enhance science teaching practices at CBHS.

College Physics students took part in experiments that are not only relevant to the Physics topic they are studying but also relevant in society.





One of the activities they did was to detect radioactivity using a Geiger counter. Students' engagement in the experiments motivated them to ask higher order questions. The program shed light on the possibilities of STEM subjects and future pathways within Science.



College Senior Science were amazed by the experiments and activities that Tom showed them about light. They observed how holograms were formed because of reflection and made a simple device to use with their mobile phones that would produce holograms. They found out that none of them were colour blind and looked at polarising lenses and polarising computer screens.

Make Me A Martian

Science is Now a Game

On Friday, March 10, 7H and 7T watched a live game show on Australia's Science Channel. *Make Me A Martian* is the game show that is out of this world! The contestants were environmental scientist Carmel Johnston, and *Mars One* candidate Josh Richards.



Carmel Johnston, who has a Masters of Science in Land Resources and Environmental Sciences, recently finished serving as the Crew Commander of The University of Hawaii's 365 day Mars simulation mission, where she and five other people lived in complete isolation for an entire year to simulate a Mars mission. The other candidate was Physicist, Explosives Engineer, Soldier, Comedian and Astronaut Candidate, Josh Richards. Josh found his true calling in 2012 when he discovered the Mars One project. Selected from over 200,000 applicants, he's currently one of 100 astronaut candidates short-listed to leave Earth forever to colonise Mars in 2027. Carmel and Josh were put through their paces and no Martian stone was left unturned to help 7T and 7H figure out who should win!

Hospitality Scholarship Launch

All Year 10 students were invited to apply for the scholarship and their applications were reviewed by members of the school executive, taking into account their academic record and participation in school programs. Ten students were awarded full scholarships for a *Certificate II in Hospitality* which they will complete in 2017 alongside their Year 10 school work.



The program offers a variety of work skills and competencies. Students will study Food Handling and Hygiene; Service Skills; Workplace Communication and Responsible Service Laws. Preparation and service of coffee will also be part of the course.

The opportunities for practical experience during the program are extensive and students will exit the course with readiness to work across a variety of areas in the industry. As part of the course students will undertake two 3 hour shifts of compulsory work experience in the CHPRSL Café.

The hospitality industry provides a variety of full time and part time career opportunities and students will benefit from successful completion of this course whether they intend to transition into the workforce or attend university.

This is the second year that CHPRSL has funded this fantastic program for our school. The partnership between the club and the school is of great value to the community and we look forward to seeing our students progress through this course.

Career Planning Interviews



In Term 4 last year, College 1 and individual student Interviews were conducted by the Careers Adviser and students were given a copy of their Career Plan to

follow and show their family. This Career Plan outlines student career aspirations beyond the HSC, steps required to achieve their goals as well as a 'back-up' plan in the event that the original goal is not achieved. Students have been advised to discuss their plans with their teacher mentors and family and to seek support in pursuing their goals. Parents/carers are welcome to contact the Careers Adviser on 9798 8444 to discuss their student's post school options or alternatively make an appointment to meet with the Careers Adviser.

Year 9 Careers Classes

This term Year 9 students had some lessons introducing them to post-school pathway options, such as university, TAFE, private colleges, apprenticeships, traineeships and employment. It is important for students to develop awareness of each option and start thinking about their own future. Students also learnt about: school based traineeships (which can commence in Year 10); purpose of work experience; how to apply for a Tax File Number: how to obtain their first casual job in retail or fast food sectors: and how to write a resume. Each student completed a Learning and Transition Plan, setting both learning and career goals. The Careers Adviser will refer to

these profiles to plan for meaningful and relevant careers excursions and activities to assist with career exploration. Each student completed an online careers



quiz called Discover Me. This quiz matches strengths and personality style to career choice. A report was generated and sent to student's each email. outlining personality types and lists of recommended careers that suit their style. Next term students will explore the different options and careers relevant to their subjects.

Year 10 Careers Classes

Year 10 students completed an online careers quiz called My Career Profile on Myfuture.edu.au website. Students answered questions regarding their interests and skills, and received feedback about types of careers to which they would be suited. Students also completed a Learning and Transition Plan setting both learning and career goals. The Careers Adviser will refer to these profiles to plan for meaningful and relevant careers excursions and activities to assist students with career exploration and planning. Next term students will explore in detail the various pathway options available and requirements of each pathway in preparation for subject selection in the senior school.

ADFA Overnight Trip



We were very lucky to be amongst six students chosen from our school, to attend an overnight trip to the Australian Defence Force Academy (ADFA) in Canberra. We are very thankful to UNSW ASPIRE and ADFA for organising this amazing opportunity.

We gained great insight into the ADFA campus and its courses, as well as an understanding of the different pathways available in the defence forces. We learnt about the entry requirement into ADFA and officer level jobs and what it is like to be a student at ADFA. The ATAR required for entry to ADFA ranges from 75 to 85. There are over 1000 students at ADFA and it is compulsory to live on campus. Students are paid \$37,000 per year to study at ADFA with a \$5000 increase each year.



Highlights of the trip included experiencing the flight simulator, a tour of the campus and its sporting facilities, visiting the War Memorial, and going bowling as one of the planned leisure activities.

For our future, we are considering joining the defence forces. 'I would like to join the Air Force and study Aeronautical Engineering at ADFA.' (Miguel). 'I would like to join the Army and study Engineering.' (Chen).

Counsellor's Advice

How to Maximise your Son's Learning



- 1. Make sure he sleeps well.
- The brain needs rest to work properly. It is then able to focus on tasks, put emotional experiences into context and create controlled and appropriate responses.
- How much sleep do people need?
 - -Primary School: 10-12 hours per day.
 - -High School: 9-11 hours per day.
 - -Adults: 7-9 hours per day.
- Parents can help by insisting on set bedtimes.
- Need help- Google twilight and flux.



- 2. <u>Make sure his use of technology is appropriate.</u>
- The amount of time adolescents spend in front of a screen (computer, tablet or phone) can affect attention, concentration and mood. There can be negative impact on the teenager if too much time is spent using technology.
- How much screen time is acceptable?
 This depends on the purpose of the activity, but for non-learning activities up to 2 hours daily is fine beyond that is leading to potential internet misuse.

How can I help as a parent?



- No technology in bedrooms after a certain time, usually an hour before sleep;
- Set the internet to cut off at a reasonable time if necessary;
- Set up a charging point (maybe in the kitchen) for everyone's devices to charge overnight;
- Encourage balance between the realworld and virtual world by encouraging friends, social activities and sport activities:

- 3. Delay supplying alcohol at home.
