Welcome Parents, Staff and Students to another edition of Canterbury Tales.

Connections with Canterbury Girls High School - Last week I had a very positive meeting with the newly appointed Principal of Canterbury Girls High School, Ms Belinda Conway. One of the many items we spoke about was re-establishing positive connections between the two neighbouring schools. I am very happy to say that there are some very exciting plans for the future, the first being a band program for students from Canterbury Public, Canterbury Girls and Canterbury Boys High School in 2021. Both Ms Conway and I share a similar ideology where we want our respective high



schools to be the centre of our local community. I am confident that together we can both assist each other in achieving this goal.

Enrichment Program Update - As you are all aware in 2021 we will be introducing an Enrichment Program across the school. Saturday 27 June is the day year 6 students from across our local community will be coming to complete their High Ability Selection Test, following this they will then have an interview where they will present their personal portfolio highlighting their interests and strengths. The exam has been very well received, with the first exam being sold out and the second one very close to capacity. - 4. Reconnected with the proud traditions of our school and alumni.
- 5. Engaged with our community through social media, re-establishing a vibrant P&C and creating the COVID-19 Council.
- 6. Developed and introduced an Enrichment Program for high potential students in 2021.

We are all working hard to establish a culture of excellence in the classroom where high expectations are expected and challenges are celebrated. We are a school that recognises and supports the serious learner.

Recognising our student leaders - On Thursday 25 June I had the pleasure, with Ms Stamos, to escort our student leaders to the offices of The Honourable MP for Watson, Mr Tony Bourke so that the boys could be presented with their leadership awards. CANTERBURY TALES DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



There's a lot happening in teaching and learning at CBHS right now. Here are some highlights:

• The Year 7 & 8 **Accelerated Reader program** is about to begin. The AR program builds reading comprehension with a motivational, individualised approach. Thanks Ms Cox and your AR team for this important initiative.

Some of our Year 7 and 8 students have created a video

to promote the AR program – keep an eye out for it on our Facebook page: it's five stars. In the process, the boys learnt about storyboarding, scriptwriting, green screens and other dramatic techniques. Mr Helidoniotis and Ms Christofides were excellent drama/film coaches! Well done Sakthy, Louis, Jahin, Nishanth, Sosaia, Hugo and Jaziah.

• Year 10 are currently sitting their **Minimum Standards Tests** in preparation for the HSC – and we have **100% SUCCESS** in the online reading tests – all students achieved the required Level 3 or Level 4 (the highest level in these tests).

Coming up this week, are the writing and numeracy tests of skills for everyday life. Students who demonstrate the standard have the skills to do things like:

- follow safety instructions in equipment manuals
- understand a mobile phone plan
- write a job application
- create a personal weekly budget.
- Year 10 are also beginning their very important **subject selection process** for Stage 6 in week 10 this term. Parents, please enjoy your discussions with your son about making his choices: we expect him to select courses that will challenge and engage him for the final two years of his schooling.
- I've been speaking with **College students** in particular about the concept of self-regulation: this is the ability to act in your long-term best interest, on a day-to-day basis. It's checking your own actions and behaviours without needing someone else (eg parent, teacher) supervising you.

Many of our students showed self-regulation when they were learning at home – it's important to maintain and build on those skills. I'd encourage our College parents to check in with your son about his study plan and time management both at home and how he manages his time in class. Focus in class is the cornerstone of success.



• Developing our **Enrichment Focus**: Our executive team has examined the current research on identifying potential and developing talent in our students. We've just established our across-faculty Enrichment Team, co-ordinated by Mr Smith with Mr Miller's assistance. The team will be leading our teachers' professional learning in Terms 3 and 4 in this area. As part of this focus, Ms Webster and I have been visiting our local primary schools to talk with Stage 3 students and teachers, building and maintaining connections in our community.

• I'd like to share an example of excellence in learning. Shannen Grech, Year 12, wrote the following as part of his English topic, We are Australian, with the focus of 'Where I'm From'. It's a beautiful piece of writing.

CANTERBURY KITCHEN RULES

Last Thursday Mr Dukes' College 1 & 2 Food technology class made Baked Macaroni cheese. Please enjoy....

Baked Macaroni and Cheese

INGREDIENTS

MACARONI:

- o 250g macaroni or elbow pasta
- 1 tbsp (15g) unsalted butter

TOPPING:

- o 2/3 cup (40g) panko breadcrumbs
- o 2 tbsp (30g) unsalted butter
- 1/4 tsp salt

SAUCE:

- o 4 tbsp (60g) unsalted butter
- 1/3 cup (50g) plain flour plain
- o 3 cups (750 ml) warmed milk
- o 2 cups (200g) shredded tasty cheese
- 1 cup (100g) shredded mozzarella cheese
- o 3/4 tsp salt

SEASONINGS:

- o 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1/2 tsp onion powder
- 1/2 tsp mustard powder

METHOD

- 1. Bring a large pot of water to the boil. Add macaroni and cook per packet directions MINUS 1 minute.
- 2. Drain, return pasta to pot, add butter and toss until melted. Set aside to cool while making the Sauce
- 3. Mix together topping. Set aside.
- 4. Preheat oven to 180°C/350°F.
- 5. In a large saucepan or in an ovenproof skillet, melt butter over medium heat. Add flour and cook, stirring constantly, for 1 minute.
- 6. Add about 1 cup of the milk and mix to dissolve the paste into the milk. Then add remaining milk and mix until lump free (use whisk if required).
- 7. Mix in salt and Seasonings.
- 8. Cook, stirring/whisking regularly, for 5 8 minutes until thickened to a cream consistency.
- 9. Remove from stove, add cheese and stir cheese doesn't need to melt.
- 10. Pour Sauce into pot with Macaroni. Stir quickly, then pour back into the skillet (I did this) or a baking dish. Sprinkle with breadcrumb topping.
- 11. Bake for 25 minutes or until top is light golden. Don't bake for too long otherwise you'll bake away the Sauce.

UAC APPLICATIONS

University applications are now open. Students can select up to 5 university preferences.

Apply through UAC at www.uac.edu.au

Students will need their NESA Student Number and UAC PIN to apply.

Once a UAC application has been made students can apply for the **School** Recommendation Scheme, Educational Access Scheme and Equity Scholarships via the UAC website.

School Recommendation Scheme

Some universities offer the SRS which enables students to be assessed on criteria other than just the ATAR.

UNIVERSITY EARLY ENTRY SCHEMES

University early entry programs recognise a student's academic performance alongside their extracurricular activities that demonstrate leadership, community service and personal achievement.

Macquarie University

Macquarie Leaders and Achievers Early Entry Scheme Opens 1 June Closes 31 August. This scheme recognises student's academic performance and extracurricular activities beyond the classroom. Students are required to include up to three examples of their involvement in leadership and service during Year 11 or Year 12. This may include voluntary or paid activities.

ACU Community Achiever Program

This scheme recognises student's academic performance and extracurricular activities. The ACU Passion for Business course requires an ATAR of 70 and an 80 for Law. The University of Notre Dame Early Offer Program

UNSW Gateway

Opens July 6 and closes August 3. This scheme significantly adjusts the ATAR requirements for courses and provides students with an early conditional offer to UNSW. Students need to apply online and answer 3 personal questions, submit a recent report, and two samples of marked assessment tasks. Visit <u>https://www.futurestudents.unsw.edu.au/year-12</u>

University of Sydney E12 Early Offer

Closes 20 September. Receive a conditional offer before the HSC exams and benefit from a \$5,950 scholarship. This scheme significantly adjusts the ATAR requirements up to 10 points below the published ATAR for courses. To be eligible for E12, students must apply for the Educational Access Scheme (EAS) under the category of experiencing financial hardship (codes: F01A, F01B, F01C and F01D). Students need to submit an online application answering 3 questions: Other than your regular schoolwork, consider activities you have been involved in or achievements you have made, which are meaningful to you. What are your three best academic achievements? Tell us why you want to study the course you have chosen. To see courses offered visit:

This scheme takes a holistic view of each individual applicant and considers a range of factors including: Year 11 subject performance, whether the applicant has experienced disadvantage that has impacted performance in Year 11, the applicant's performance at required interview or participation in compulsory engagement activity, and an applicant's responses to questions relating to Readiness, Motivation and Passion, Planning and Persistence, Communication and Collaboration.
